QIS – All In is an Erasmus+ Sport project dedicated to improving the accessibility and inclusiveness of sports facilities for people of all abilities.

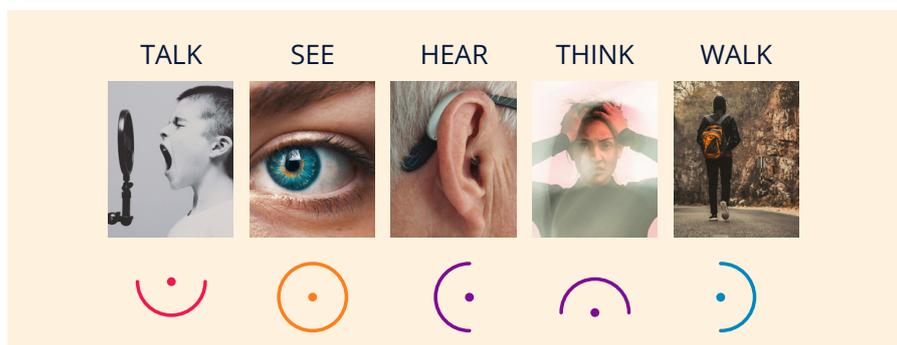

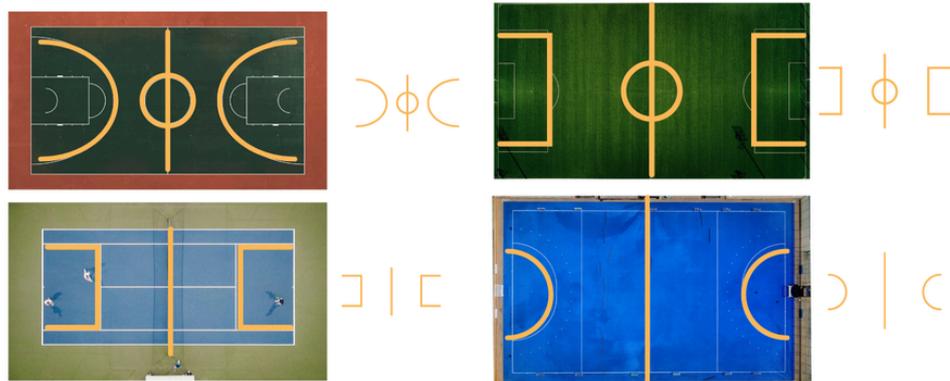
Europeans live with some form of disability

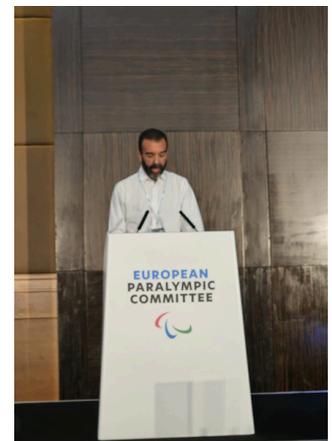


Kick-off Meeting in Lisbon

Our journey officially began in February 2025 with the Kick-off meeting hosted by NPC Portugal. All eight partners gathered to align on project goals, responsibilities, and the vision behind QIS – All In. From inclusive design to certification tools, the stage was set for impactful collaboration across five countries.

Trying Adaptive Sports at TPM Malaga

In October 2025, project partners met in Malaga to experience accessibility firsthand. The Spanish Paralympic Committee welcomed the team to explore adaptive sports like goalball and wheelchair basketball, and to visit local sports facilities—evaluating accessibility from the user's perspective. These insights will directly feed into our tools and certification process.
